The combined inventory of beef, pork, chicken and turkey in cold storage at the end of December was 2.177 billion pounds, 2.4% higher than a year ago and 8.6% higher than the five year average. With more meat products going into export markets, it is reasonable to expect cold storage stocks to increase over time. Thus, it is important to continue to look at the cold storage numbers in the context of trade flows as well as slaughter/production trends.

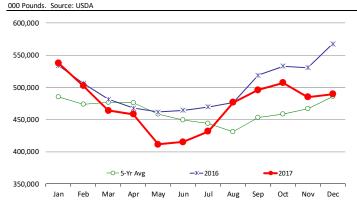
Total beef inventories at the end of December were 489.5 million pounds, 13.8% less than last year and just 0.7% higher than the five year average. The main reason we see the beef inventory number as positive or bullish for the market is because overall beef production and imports increased during December while exports were slightly lower. Despite the increase in overall product availability, total beef supplies in cold storage were up just 0.7% compared to the previous month. In the last five years beef cold storage stocks in December rose on average 4% compared to November levels. Beef demand remains in good shape and that is helping keep the supply moving rather than backing up in cold storage.

USDA reported that there were 491 million pounds of pork in cold storage at the end of December, 3.2% more than a year ago but still about 6.7% less than the five year average. We think pork exports were modestly lower in December. Normally pork stocks decline in December retailers draw down their ham stocks for Christmas features. Last year holiday needs and excellent exports caused pork inventories to decline 8% vs. November. This year stocks declined 2.3%, not as much as last year but still ahead of the five year average pace of 1.7%. We generally view the overall pork inventory number as neutral for that reason. Belly stocks have been increasing, up 120% compared to the minimal levels of a year ago. Belly inventory build is following a more seasonal path and we think that will help keep belly prices in check and avoid a repeat of what happened last year.

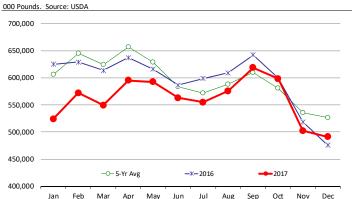
Chicken supplies remain heavy even as strong exports have allowed producers to quickly deplete the inventory of leg quarters. The supply of breast meat in cold storage remains burdensome. Total breast meat stocks were 188 million pounds, 1% less than last year but still some 23% higher than the five year average. Leg quarter stocks, on the other hand, were down 18% from last year and 19% from the five year average. A lower inventory of dark meat in cold storage and robust export demand should continue to bolster dark meat prices while breast meat may have to stay at historically low price levels until spring demand kicks in.

Bottom line: US meat protein supplies continue to expand but product flow remains good and freezer inventories are only marginally higher than last year, an indication that meat demand remains in good shape.

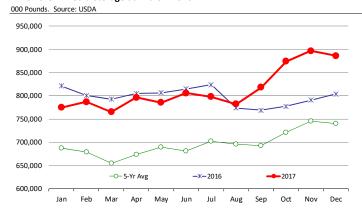
All Beef In Cold Storage at End of Month
