# **Daily Livestock Report**


The total inventory of beef, pork, chicken and turkey at the end of March was 2.373 billion pounds, 1.5% lower than a year ago but still 7.6% higher than the five year average. Combined red meat and poultry Inventories declined 1.6% from the previous month compared to an average drawdown in inventory of 1.5% in the last five years. The report results may be construed as neutral to moderately bullish, especially considering robust export demand later this spring and into the summer months.

The supply of boneless beef in cold storage was estimated at 420.8 million pounds, 1.3% lower than a year ago and near the same level as the five year average. Boneless beef inventories declined 6.7% compared to the previous month while in the last five years the average drawdown has been 2.9%. Lower beef imports and improving demand likely contributed to the above average drawdown and we view the number as supportive for beef prices post Easter and into Memorial Day. The inventory of bone-in beef cuts was 29.8 million pounds, 21% lower than a year ago and 25% lower than the five year average. End users sought to improve their inventory position going into Memorial Day but freezer stocks are lower than normal and may be viewed as supportive for beef prices, especially bone-in rib prices in late April and May.

The total inventory of pork products in cold storage at the end of March was 610.1 million pounds, 0.1% lower than a year ago and only 1.1% higher than the five year average. Pork inventories at the end of March were about 1% lower than the previous month compared to a 4.1% drawdown in stocks for the last five years. This may be construed as somewhat negative for pork prices but we think that overstates the case. Easter was late this year, which may have delayed the normal drawdown in ham inventories. Also, fear of higher prices down the road may have induced some end users to bolster their inventories earlier than normal. The total inventory of all hams in cold storage was 100.5 million pounds, 7.4% higher than a year ago and 10% higher than the five year average. It is not unusual for end users to start building their belly freezer stocks during Mar-May and this year is no different. Pork belly inventory in the freezer at the end of March was 58.8 million pounds, 9.3% higher than the previous month. In the last five years the pork belly inventory build has averaged 4% but in the last two years March inventories have increased by 27% and 21%. Very high belly prices in the first two months of April suggest a very rapid pace of inventory building. Unknown at this time is the amount of bellies/bacon inventory put away as finished product. Rib inventory was 140.9 million pounds, 1.2% lower than the previous month compared to an average 4% increase in the last five years. Pork rib inventories at the end of March were 2.2% lower than a year ago.


The supply of all chicken products in cold storage was 845.5 million pounds, 3% lower than the previous year but still 13% higher

than the five year average. Breast meat inventory was 176.7 million pounds, 5% lower than the previous month and in line with the normal drawdown in stocks. Whole bird inventory declined 2.9% from the previous month but still 20% higher than in 2018.

In the last five years the normal inventory increase during March has been 16% but this year, faced with weak prices and burdensome supplies, fewer whole birds ended up in the freezer. Total inventory of whole turkeys at the end of March was 222.9 million pounds, only 3.8% higher than in February and just 1.9% higher than last year.
